MEDIA RELEASE: NEW SOCIAL MEDIA CHALLENGE COULD RESULT IN HOUSE FIRE.

New TikTok Challenge Posing Serious Electrical Risks Electrical Safety Authority reminds of the dangers of electricity.

The Electrical Safety Authority (ESA) is issuing a warning to all Ontarians not to participate or share a "challenge" on the social media platform TikTok that could lead to electrical fires and pose a serious safety risk. [Note: The so-called #OutletChallenge or #PennyChallenge consists of someone sliding a coin in between a phone charger that is loosely plugged into an outlet and then sharing the video to social media.] Despite the electrical damage caused by their actions, some TikTok users continue to put themselves and others at immediate risk for injury or fatality. "While no known injuries have been reported so far, the popularity of this challenge and the serious risk posed by the actions in these videos are very concerning," says Dr. Joel Moody, Chief Public Safety Officer, ESA. "Electricity is unforgiving, and no family should have to endure the pain of losing a loved one or their home because of a social media trend." Every year in Ontario, 110 kids under 15 go to the hospital because of a preventable electrical injury. ESA is an administrative authority acting on behalf of the Government of Ontario to ensure that Ontarians can continue to live, work and play free from electrical harm.
