## HEADED TO THE COTTAGE FOR THE LONG WEEKEND? ADD THESE ITEMS TO YOUR TO DO LIST!

Before you begin your long weekend of relaxation at the cottage, please be sure to perform a few simple fire safety activities ...

- Check your gutters. The gutters on your cottage (and home) provide a place for combustible material to accumulate. An open eaves creates an entry point for sparks and embers to land; increasing the risk of fire.
- Cut the grass. Keep grass cut to less than 10cm fires can ignite and travel quickly through long grass. And while you're surveying your property, please also ensure that there are no trees or other vegetation overhanging your roof, which can also contribute to the spread of fire.
- Get moving! Move your firewood 10-30 meters away from your house to help prevent the spread of fire.
- Clean the grill. Before asking who wants burgers and who wants hot dogs, be sure
  that you have thoroughly cleaned the barbecue, burners and the briquettes (which
  often have a lot of grease buildup). This will help to prevent flare ups. Don't forget to
  check to make sure the drip tray isn't full of grease. If it is, it's time to replace it.

## Grilling Safety Fast Fact

In roughly 1 of every 5 grill fires, grills have not been cleaned.

To prevent fires, keep grills clean.





To help prevent fires and injuries when grilling this summer, we encourage you to review the following practices, tips and tricks when it comes to grilling and BBQ'ing.

Perform a thorough safety inspection before lighting the grill/BBQ. Make sure everything is in good working order. Check for:

- blocked burners or metal tubes near the burners
- damaged or leaking fittings and hoses (use a soapy water solution and check for bubbles, if you see bubbles, have the barbecue serviced by an authorized professional and then re-check for leaks)
- replace cracked or damaged hoses even if they are not leaking
- a damaged seal (check the seal when you get your barbecue tank refilled and check for leaks after re-installing)

When setting up your barbecue, make sure it is:

- outside and in a well-ventilated area (never inside or in an enclosed space)
- far away from combustible materials, windows and doors, deck railings and away from

eaves and overhanging tree branches


• on an even surface to reduce the risk of it tipping over

Only use an approved charcoal lighter fluid to start a charcoal-fired grill and never add any flammable liquid to a burning fire.

Be sure to follow manufacturer's instructions for lighting gas grills. If the barbecue does not light right away, turn off the gas and wait for the gas to dissipate before re-lighting

If you have a charcoal barbecue, make sure the charcoal has cooled down completely before you dispose of it (in a metal container). This could take several hours.

And lastly, remember, never leave a lit grill unattended.



#### TRANSPORTING YOUR PROPANE TANK

Do you need to refill the propane for your grill? The <u>Technical Standards & Safety Authority</u> would like to remind you that there is a right way and a wrong way to transport propane tanks.

- 1. Do NOT put the propane tank loose in the trunk of your car. Instead, secure it using a seatbelt in the back seat of your vehicle.
- 2. Ensure that the propane tank is upright and that the service valve is plugged
